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McCracken County utilizes new position to combat

truancy, provide support to Campus Police Officers

When McCracken County Campus Police Officer Wes Orazine first inquired about a part-time School Resource Officer (SRO) position in the fall of 2021, he had no intention of being involved with student attendance. In fact, the very notion of that type of work made his head spin. "Dealing with truancy was something I definitely didn't want to do," Orazine admitted. "I knew there would be a lot of headaches involved, and it was something I didn't feel was right for me." However, when Director of Pupil Personnel (DPP), Brian Bowland learned about Orazine's job application, he had big ideas in mind. Orazine's long and successful law enforcement career in Paducah and McCracken County would provide the perfect level of experience needed to combat chronic student absenteeism. Mr. Bowland called Orazine to discuss a new approach to truancy which would utilize a sworn officer to investigate and file charges on cases within the district. Hoping to circumvent the red tape which civilian attendance employees often faced at the courthouse, this position was the brainchild of DPP Bowland, district Attendance Specialist David Kell, and SRO Supervisor Bruce Watson. Understanding the potential impact of this new role and deciding to accept the challenge, Wes Orazine was hired in January 2022. When McCracken County Public Schools created its own school-based law enforcement agency in August 2022, Orazine was among the ranks of Campus Police Officers being swornin. Since that moment, he has hit the ground running. In the 2022/2023 school year, Orazine filed more truancy related charges with the McCracken County Attorney than the district had submitted in the previous five years combined. He immediately found himself in the homes of repeat offenders, looking for root causes of student attendance problems and providing levels of accountability never before reached. As a result of his investment with these families, the districtwide attendance rate increased between the 2022/2023 and 2023/2024 school years. It did not take him long to realize that, despite the difficulty he anticipated in the beginning, his job is meaningful. "I think my work has made a significant impact within the district," he reflected. "To be a Police Officer with the ability to go a little bit further makes a big difference in how we operate." On top of his direct involvement with district students and families, Orazine regularly collaborates with other agencies and plays a valuable part in local groups which provide support to McCracken County students. He often provides information to local Homeless Student Liaisons and meets monthly with the Family, Accountability, Intervention and Response (F.A.I.R.) Team. The F.A.I.R. Team consists of representatives from the Department of Juvenile Justice, Child Protective Services, County Attorney's Office, and Four Rivers Behavioral Health, just to name a few. Their goal is to proactively offer services to students in need and help families create positive changes in their lives. The F.A.I.R. Team's unified focus is keeping students out of the criminal court system.

In addition to the many roles he plays with truancy and juvenile court, Orazine routinely provides support to McCracken Campus Police SROs. He has backed up other SROs on welfare checks, suspicious persons, service of warrants, large event coverage, and various other emergencies which have occurred. He keeps an office at the Board of Education, often being the first responder for any type of security issue in and around that building. Orazine has also completed all three levels of state-mandated SRO training, and he recently designed the new paint and graphics scheme for McCracken County Campus Police cruisers. "I can depend on Officer Orazine to help out in any situation that arises during the school day," explained Austin Guill, McCracken County Chief of Campus Police. "He is always developing ideas and strategies to advance our department and our district as a whole. Our students are undoubtedly safer and more successful because of him." Orazine hopes that the success of McCracken County's hybrid Truancy Officer/SRO position sparks interest from other districts across the Commonwealth of Kentucky as they look for ways to address attendance issues and provide an enhanced layer of security for their campuses. His dedication to the role has laid a solid foundation for McCracken County to build upon for many years to come as safety and student welfare remain a top priority.
